False Alarm Data

- MCSO Calls for Service (CFS) capture data under several alarm categories including:
 - False Burglar Alarm
 - Audible Burglar Alarm
 - Silent Burglar Alarm
 - Panic Alarm
 - False Panic Alarm
 - Silent Panic Alarm



False Alarm Data

- In 2012, MCSO responded to 897 False Alarms.
- 99.23% were classified as false.
- 7 were actual incidents.
- The statistics do not distinguish between residential and commercial properties.
- False Alarms are routinely in the top 5
 CFS annually.



False Alarm Reduction Programs

- Elements
 - Adoption of a false alarm ordinance.
 - Permit tracking.
 - Applications
 - Permit Fees
 - Permit Renewals
 - Ordinance Violations
 - Fines for Violations
 - Dispute resolution process.
 - Educational component (Optional).
 - Alarm awareness class
 - Provides a waiver for use towards a false alarm violation



Goals

- Reduce the number of repetitive false alarms.
- Educate owners/users to take responsibility for their systems and ensure future compliance.

Permit Requirement

- Allows Town to track violations.
- Warning and Assessment letters can be issued.
- Collections
- Provide false alarm prevention tips.
- What if the property does not have a permit and a has a false alarm?
 - Assessed the false alarm fee and required to obtain a permit within 30 days.

Violations

- Allow for a fixed number of false alarms prior to a fee assessment.
- Tracked over a 365 day period.
- Excessive violations may result in the revocation of the permit.
 - Failure to pay assessed fees constitutes a violation of the ordinance.
- Failure to pay assessed fees may result in the individual being charged with a Class 1 Misdemeanor.

- Appeals
 - Alarm user required to file a written notice.
 - Hearing conducted by:
 - Police Chief
 - Town Manager or designee
 - Municipal-appointed Hearing Officer

 - False Alarm Data Management System
 - Utilized by Apache Junction PD
- CryWolf
 - Used by a number of Valley jurisdictions
 - Options
 - Town Operated
 - Outsourcing
 - On-Demand



Timeline

- May 2014
 - Town Council possible ordinance adoption
- June-July-August 2014
 - Outreach to citizens and business community
 - Software selection
 - Develop program forms
- September 2014
 - Meet with alarm providers to obtain assistance with outreach efforts
 - Begin gathering permit data
- December 2014
 - Ordinance becomes effective (7 months from adoption)
