B. Consideration and possible action on a recommendation to Town Council on the Parks and Recreation Master Plan Update - Scott McCarty, Finance Director (presentation attached)

"Playing Catch Up" with Infrastructure Given Recent and Expected Growth

- Parks and Recreation LOS is More Subjective Because Some Amenities and Services are Provided by Private Sector (Barney Sports Complex, HOA Amenities, School Facilities, etc.) – Which is Not the Case with All Other Infrastructure
- Tables showing existing amenity inventory and estimated amenities surplus (deficit)
 - Many amenities would still be in a deficit of the recommended LOS if the Town developed all park acres currently owned
 - Deficit of 99 acres, 14 ballfields, 2 multi-use fields, 9 basketball courts, 6 volleyball courts, 22 tennis/pickleball and a dog park
- The schedule moving forward:
 - o March 6 Focus Group Meeting
 - o March 7 Town Council Update
 - o March 29 Focus Group Meeting
 - o April 10 Return to PRAC
 - Pending items: trails, neighborhood parks, comparison jurisdictions, dashboard/"what if" analysis, and focus group feedback

Questions/Comments:

- Get what you are saying about the neighborhood HOA parks but do not necessarily
 agree with it. As a whole the community does not have access to these parks and HOA
 parks lack basic amenities, such as restrooms. HOA park visits are a 30-60 minute trip
 before you have to go home.
- LOS benchmarking cities do not count those HOA parks and school playgrounds or fields in their LOS.
- Seems to be a huge correction to fees that were not set correctly.
- Kids in a neighborhood do not always end up on the same team so the team will not be able to use HOA fields for practice and the Town cannot program that space.
- If we can say this about parks, couldn't we also say that each community can provide
 their own mini fire department. But why don't we? It would not make sense that's why.
 Need to be aware of when to draw the line on what does not make sense for them to
 provide. The Town provides these types of amenities such as community parks and fire
 service because it's on a bigger and better scale.
- Is PRAC open to a discount on impact fees to offset the investment if developers go above and beyond the minimal open space requirement?
 - o NO
- Not everyone(developers) are using the parks, but everyone is driving on the crowded roads.
- Displeased that so many investors who do not live in QC are member of this focus group advising the council in determining the impact fees. What is the proportion of residents versus non residents on the focus group?
- Can staff look up how many possible home permits are left to collect fees from?
- Hard pressed to find anyone on PRAC who would vote for anything less than the maximum allowed by law. Gave us those two options in your presentation but we want the most not less because we are already so far behind in our level of service.
- What PRAC is willing to recommend is the staff recommended LOS at \$68M (40 acres per 10k population) slide with the addition of purchasing the 99 acres within 10 years.
