There was discussion about accuracy rates in reaching the target audience (i.e. Town residents), using pre-qualifying questions for on-line surveys and reporting on responses received.

Planning Director Brett Burningham gave a brief introduction of the four proposed text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and explained staff's recommendation to continue Ordinance 696-19 Industrial Design Guidelines to a future meeting. Principal Planner Erik Swanson reviewed the three proposed text amendments: Conditional Use Permits; Site Plan Review; and General Zoning Ordinance clean-up (scriveners errors, formatting).

The Public Hearing was opened. No one came forth and the Public Hearing was closed.

**13. <u>Final Action:</u>** If you wish to speak to the Council on an item listed under Final Action, please complete a Request to Speak Card and turn it in to the Town Clerk. Speakers will be called upon in the order in which their cards are received. Speakers are limited to three (3) minutes each.

A. Consideration and possible action on the Town's FY 2019/20 Tentative Budget of \$452.7 million. In addition, set the public hearing for May 15, 2019 for both the Final Budget and the Truth in Taxation per requirements under Arizona State statues.

Town Manager John Kross discussed the process and statutory requirements for adopting the Town's annual budget. Mr. Kross stated that special consideration is given to growth projections and current financial policies that include the pension funding policy for public safety (MCSO & QCFMD is funded at 100%) and ASRS is partially funded; \$6.5M capital transportation program; utility funding/infrastructure repair; and employee compensation. New policies include the groundwater extinguishment credits and new debt issues for purchase of water rights and Signal Butte and Meridian Roads improvements; CAGRD assessment reduction and increase in water & wastewater reserves along with a wastewater rate reduction.

Mr. Kross discussed the primary property tax that was approved by voters in 2007 exclusively for funding public safety and three levy options for consideration: Option A: same revenue as current year (\$7.0M) which would be \$1.3M less than the maximum (includes Ironwood Crossing); Option B: same revenue as current year plus new construction (\$7.8M) which would be \$531K less than the maximum; and Option C: maximum revenue (\$8.3M) which would be a \$1.3M increase over current year (includes Ironwood Crossing, new construction and existing properties). Mr. Kross stated staff recommends Option C.

Mr. Kross also reviewed the overall FY19/20 tentative budget where the budget increase is within infrastructure, transportation, and the acquisition and financing of water/wastewater infrastructure. Mr. Kross discussed the 10-year budget forecast which shows reductions as infrastructure investments are completed and will continue to be evaluated as the state land develops in the future.

Finance Director Scott McCarty reviewed the operating budget and five-year financial objectives in public safety, taking on the library operating costs, fully funding ASRS and continuing the \$6M CIP PAYGO.

Mr. McCarty reviewed the operating budget revenue projections that increased mainly from the Ironwood Crossing annexation (property tax) and overall increased

sales tax. He also discussed the expenses for transportation infrastructure, public safety including new equipment; streetlight purchase; personnel costs that include 6 new positions and compensation.

Mr. McCarty explained the carryover/contingencies for projects that are currently under contract, approved but not contracted and unanticipated expenses. He also stated that there would be no water or solid waste rate increase and wastewater rates were being reduced.

Council Member Hoffman, Budget Committee member, thanked committee members Council Member Wheatley - Chair and Vice Mayor Benning as well as staff for creating the proposed budget and commented on the overall budget increase as well as the continued goal to reduce the budget once infrastructure/capital projects are completed. He suggested continued discussion on future budget reductions at the next strategic planning session.

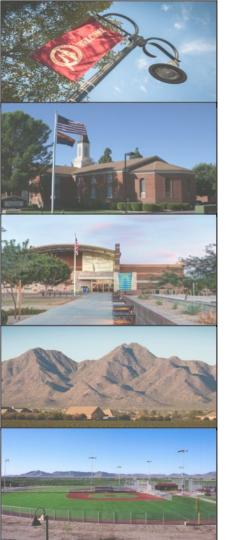

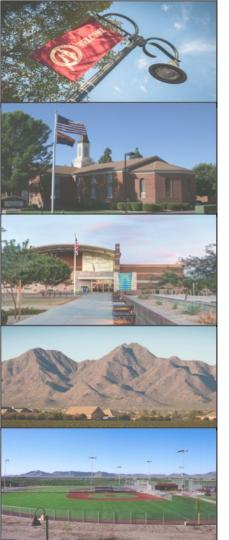
