A. Proclamation: Town of Queen Creek 30th Anniversary

Mayor Barney read the following highlights of the proclamation:

In celebration of the Town's 30th Anniversary, I will designate the month of September as a time to celebrate our beautiful community and all of its accomplishments with a proclamation, and I invite you to celebrate Queen Creek's birthday with us at Founder's Day on September 21.

Our Town may be young, but it has a rich history. On September 5, 1989, with the assistance of key State and County leaders, a group of forward thinking Queen Creek residents worked to incorporate the Town of Queen Creek under

the laws of the State of Arizona.

Following incorporation, our first Town Council undertook the important tasks of creating a General Plan to guide the development of land uses, hiring management staff to implement supporting policies, creating the first budget, and generally establishing a framework of good governance.

Queen Creek residents played an important role as well, as they came forward to support these early efforts by volunteering to serve on committees and task forces, by educating themselves on important issues and voting, and by coming together and cooperating in the face of challenges.

The past 30 years have seen dedicated leadership, sound decision-making, involved residents, quality managed growth, perseverance in tough times, pride in community, and enjoyment of a high quality of life.

Thank you to our residents, Town staff, and to my fellow Town Council Members, both present and past, for working hard to make Queen Creek the beautiful, neighborly community that it is today.

D. Recognition of APRA Awards for Mansel Carter Oasis Park

During the annual APRA awards ceremony, the Town of Queen Creek received

two awards: the Natural Resources Award for the lake at Mansel Carter Oasis Park; and the Outstanding Facility Award (population 10,001 to 100,000) for the park itself.

The Natural Resource award honors a resource that was efficiently developed and utilized, includes problem solving and focuses on conservation.

The lake at Mansel Carter Oasis Park uses recovered groundwater, allowing this important amenity to solve problems related to high water usage and the expense of water replenishment. The Outstanding Facility Award honors a facility that positively impacts leisure opportunities, includes innovative features, energy conservation and is environmentally sensitive while being functional and aesthetically appealing.

Mansel Carter Oasis Park offers 48-acres of fun, creating an experience that encourages play for all ages and abilities.

E. Recognition to Life Link Church for volunteer service

Mayor Barney recognized members of Life Link Church for their assistance in beautifying Founders' Park and the Town's Municipal Services Building. The volunteers painted the wrought iron fence around the perimeter of the Municipal Services Building, as well as the fence around the Skate Park.

Matt Strom, Assistant Superintendent, provided an overview on overrides and bonds and the purpose of each. He discussed what projects and improvements recent bonds have been used for and the requirements for override renewals, adding that overrides provide funding for teachers and programs.

Charlie Martin, Director of Business Services, discussed how the overrides have been used to increase teacher salaries; enhance security at several schools; provide smaller classroom sizes and additional special classes and programs.

Crystal Zachary, CFO, provided financial information on the use of prior overrides and explained about the term of an override and the renewal period prior to expiring. She added that the upcoming override election would be an all-mail ballot election and additional information was available on the Districts website.

Shawny Ekadis, GIS Analyst, demonstrated the variety of interactive maps available on the Town's website including the current planning cases; historic photo tour;

Queen Creek services; school districts and schools; parks and recreation facilities; Legislative Districts and cell tower location availability (streetlights) for cell phone providers.

Mayor Barney declared a conflict of interest and stepped down from dais. Vice Mayor Benning chaired this portion of the meeting.

Finance Director Scott McCarty reviewed the procedure for continuing the public hearing to the October 16, 2019 Council meeting. Mr. McCarty discussed the error found in the fee calculation for Fire, Police and Parks Fees in the single family residential category. He explained the error resulted in a total of \$399 too low.

The Public Hearing was opened.

Jackson Moll, representing the Homebuilders Association of Central Arizona, stated his support of continuing the Public Hearing to October 16, 2019 and appreciation

for the continued outreach to stakeholders. He said the stakeholders understand the fees would be increasing in January 2020 but now need to further review the additional increase. He discussed the possibility of adopting the lower fee also. Mr. Moll stated that the stakeholders remain committed to working with the Town.

Consideration and possible approval of Delegation Resolution 1283-19 for the Meridian Road Project - Phase 1, for all associated contracts, agreements, and land purchases required to complete the proposed improvements between Combs Road and Cherrywood Drive, including Project A1505 not to exceed \$4,430,000; and WA253 not to exceed \$664,245 (both projects included in the FY 2019/20 budget).

Public Works Director Troy White discussed the opportunity to move up the opening of Meridian Road by constructing a temporary roadway which would allow the required box culvert to be installed sooner. He added that temporary traffic signals would also be installed which can be re-used. Mr. White discussed the additional cost of \$380,000 for the temporary roadway and \$120,000 for temporary signals which will be re-used for other roadway projects. Mr. White stated that Pinal County is a partner in the project.

Discussion was in regard to the benefits of opening the new road sooner, including faster response times and access for Fire Station #4, as well as providing an alternative route during the Rittenhouse Road construction project.

B. Discussion and possible approval of the Sonoqui Wash Trail Design Project concept designs.

Recreation Manager Adam Robinson presented four proposed themed trail nodes to enhance the Sonogui Wash Trail:

- A. Ellsworth/Crismon/Riggs
- B. Hawes/Ellsworth/Riggs
- C. Chandler/Sossaman (Desert Wells Stage Stop)
- D. Ocotillo/Recker (west of Power Rd)

Mr. Robinson reviewed the public input participation process that included open houses; surveys and Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee meetings. He also reviewed the design components and costs of each node:

A. Hohokam theme: \$1.6M

B. Equestrian theme: \$1,25M

C. Community Gathering theme: \$1.2M

D. Agriculture theme: \$1.6M

Council asked for clarification on the costs for each node. Mr. Robinson explained that the costs differed because of the components and length of each but staff didn't have the specific breakdown for granite, plants and other materials. He also explained that the nodes are "scalable" for budgetary consideration and the estimated costs are for materials and construction, also, that the Town already owns the right-of-way for the nodes.

Council discussed the costs and opportunities to scale the nodes to fit within the development fee category and the need to have more details, including examples of scaled design and costs.

Council commended the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee, public and staff for creating and recommending the project designs.

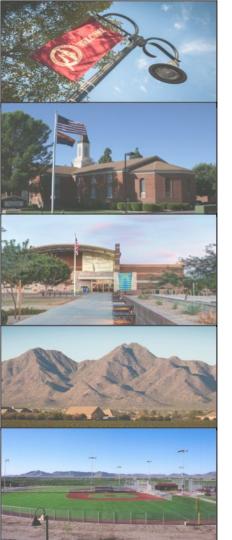


