Example – "Police Aide"

Police Aide means a volunteer or paid employee of the Police Department of the Town, including but not limited to Park Rangers, Civil Traffic Investigator, professional staff, and private contractors, and those empowered to enforce certain ordinances of the Town pursuant to A.R.S. § 28-627(E) with specific duties assigned by the Chief of Police.



Revised Chapter 9 "Example"

Serving with Respect, Compassion, and Trust

Consistency, Practicality, & Proportionality

Current ARTICLE 1-8 PENALTY



A. Any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this code, except as otherwise provided in this code, shall be guilty of a Class one misdemeanor. Each day that a violation continues shall be a separate offense punishable as hereinabove described.



Consistency, Practicality, & Proportionality

Replace with:

Section 9-13-2 Civil Offenses

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this chapter, any person who fails to comply with requirements of this chapter, or violates any of its provisions is guilty of a civil offense. Except as otherwise specifically provided, civil offenses shall be punished by imposition of a civil penalty in the amount of \$250.00 for the first offense; \$500.00 for a second offense in a 12-month period, and \$2,000.00 for a third offense in said 12-month period. For purposes of calculating the 12-month period, such period shall be measured backwards from the offense.





Avoiding Duplication

- QCPD has authority to enforce State laws
- Thus, Town Code does not need to repeat Criminal Provisions:
 - Burglary
 - Assaults
 - Murder
 - Drugs
 - Already regulated Traffic
 - Felonies
 - Etc.
- Only <u>Additional</u> Civil Offenses and Misdemeanors





Simplifying Other Town Code Sections





- Move all offenses possible to one Code Chapter
- Provide uniformity in procedures in a separate Code Chapter
- Exiting Code Chapters can focus on permitting, regulation and substance
- Simplifies for QCPD, other department and the public
