Town Council approved funding for new park facilities including East Park, the remainder of Mansel Carter Oasis Park, a multi-generational recreation center and aquatics center.





Expansion of the wash trail system continues with the groundbreaking of the Sonoqui Wash Trail from Hawes to Crismon. Design started for the extension of the Queen Creek Wash Trail from Crismon to Meridian.

The Town became the first municipality in the state to have a fully funded pension reserve, saving taxpayers nearly \$2 million annually.

Fitch, a leading provider in bond ratings, affirmed the Town's 'AA' rating for excise tax revenue bonds.

During the first year of operation, QC's first hotel, Hampton Inn had a 71% occupancy rate - serving nearly 24,000 hot waffles!




Issued nearly 1,950 single-family permits and processed more than 6,900 permits & applications, a 12% increase from the previous year.

SUPERIOR INFRASTRUCTURE

The Town created a Capital Improvement Projects, or CIP, Department, consolidating all of the Town's construction activities under one department to ensure efficiency and maximum savings.



Progress continues towards two additional water storage tanks. Bringing the total to three tanks with eight million gallons of water storage.
