#### 11) Items for Discussion:

11.A) Follow up from February, 2022 Town Council Strategic Planning Session - A Comprehensive Review of the Town's Financial Policies: Status Update #3 and Select Recommendations.

<u>Presentation: Comprehensive Review of Financial Policies</u>

Finance Director Scott McCarty presented a follow up of the Town's key financial policies and presented six recommendations to help achieve the goals of maintaining our 'AA+' bond rating and position the Town for an upgrade to 'AAA'; and to complete the comprehensive process necessary for the water and wastewater utility to receive its first bond rating by 2025.

Mr. McCarty provided a detailed presentation outlining six recommendations for Council consideration and feedback:

- 1. No Property Taxes for Infrastructure Policy (new policy) the Town will not assess a (secondary) property tax to pay for infrastructure
- 2. Pay as you go Infrastructure Funding (new policy) use a portion of the operating budget 2% construction sales tax for infrastructure funding (\$10M recommendation)
- 3. Debt Issue Placeholder (new policy) existing practice to be set into policy; create capacity in the Operating Budget for future debt issue
- 4. Operating Budget Reserve Policy (update policy) increase by \$16M

(equals one year's debt service)

- 5. Operating Budget Fund Balance Reserve Policy set a minimum of 100% of recurring expenses
- 6. New Infrastructure / Debt Management Reserve (new policy) 5-year cash accumulation \$32M

Mr. McCarty concluded with an overview of the recommended updates to the overall Debt Management Policy.

Council appreciated the six recommendations and the thorough presentation. Comments were in regards to types of infrastructure funding for the Town; the sequence of funding; the correct balance of municipal debt and ensuring that we will not have a secondary property tax.

Police Chief Randy Brice presented on overview of the updates to the Town Code in relation to micromobility. He highlighted the changes in various chapters in the Town Code in relation to terminology, towing, regulations, responsibilities of parents and guardians, traffic laws and rental agency requirements.

Chief Brice discussed the outreach efforts made with the equestrian community and said their concerns were in regards to speed on multi-use

paths; noise of engines; and response and access to emergency services. He outlined how the current and proposed code addressed the issues. He discussed changes or additions to Chapter 11 Traffic; Chapter 14 Streets and Sidewalks; Chapter 4 Police Department and Chapter 9 Offenses. Chief Brice discussed the speed and classes of motorized bicycles and devices and where each is allowed.

Council thanked Chief Brice for his efforts on this item. Comments from Council were in regards to safety and speed on the trails; being a good neighbor; trail etiquette; different mobility devices; opportunities to widen trails; signage and public outreach.

Council Member Benning stated for the record that he is opposed to motorized and power assisted vehicles on multi-use trails or the trails planned to parallel sidewalks, otherwise he is in support of the overall effort.

Town Attorney Holcomb commented on the complicated details involved in this project and recognized the amount of effort and thought by the Chief and his staff.

Vice Mayor Brown asked if there was an analysis of how prevalent the current usage of electronic bikes are on the trails and can Town Rangers do enforcement.

Chief Brice replied no, we don't have anything broken down by device. He added that motor vehicle types are strictly prohibited and will be enforced and they will do a speed study on the trails do help determine time, usage and future enforcement actions. Chief Brice said this proposal is a reasonable approach to be able to regulate prohibited activity. He said the Town Code broadens enforcement capabilities and the Police Department can train designated staff to enforce once trained.

Town Manager Bruce Gardner said there is an education piece to the community if this item moves forward.

Community Services Director Marnie Schubert said the Town will have a multifaceted and continuous campaign that includes information on the website, social media, videos, brochures and signage in the wash and on the trails. She said the Town will create a consistent message across all platforms that is directed at all age groups and volunteer groups can be used to help with the campaign.

Chief Brice gave details of the efforts that the QCPD will do to spread the message in an impactful manner for the first months and when there are seasonal changes.

Council Member Benning asked if the proposed Code changes apply to San Tan Mountain Park or trails near Horseshoe Park.

Chief Brice said that San Tan Mountain Park is the County and he does not know their policies and Horseshoe Park trails can be designated by Council if

that is something they want.

Attorney Holcomb said that area can be isolated by signage and a more restrictive approach can be delegated in areas that prohibit these devices as allowed in the proposed Code.
