To provide emergency response service to Queen Creek citizens living in non-contiguous Maricopa County Islands that live within the Town's incorporated boundaries.

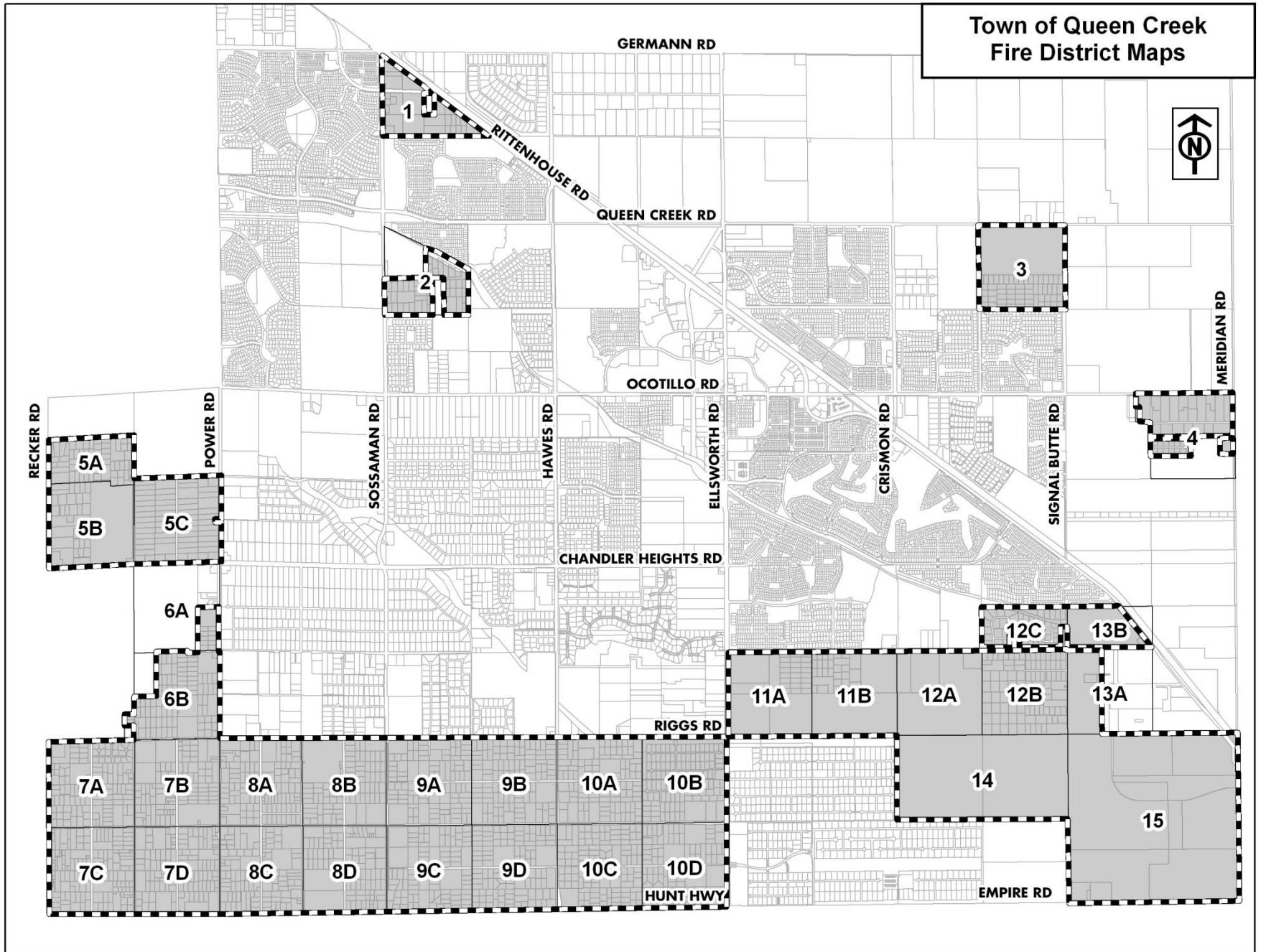
Committee Make-Ups

District Wardens

- ▣ Manage volunteer teams for collecting property owner signatures (a petition drive).
- ▣ Each district represents one-quarter of a square mile for door to door solicitation.
- ▣ Each district is labeled utilizing numbers and letters.

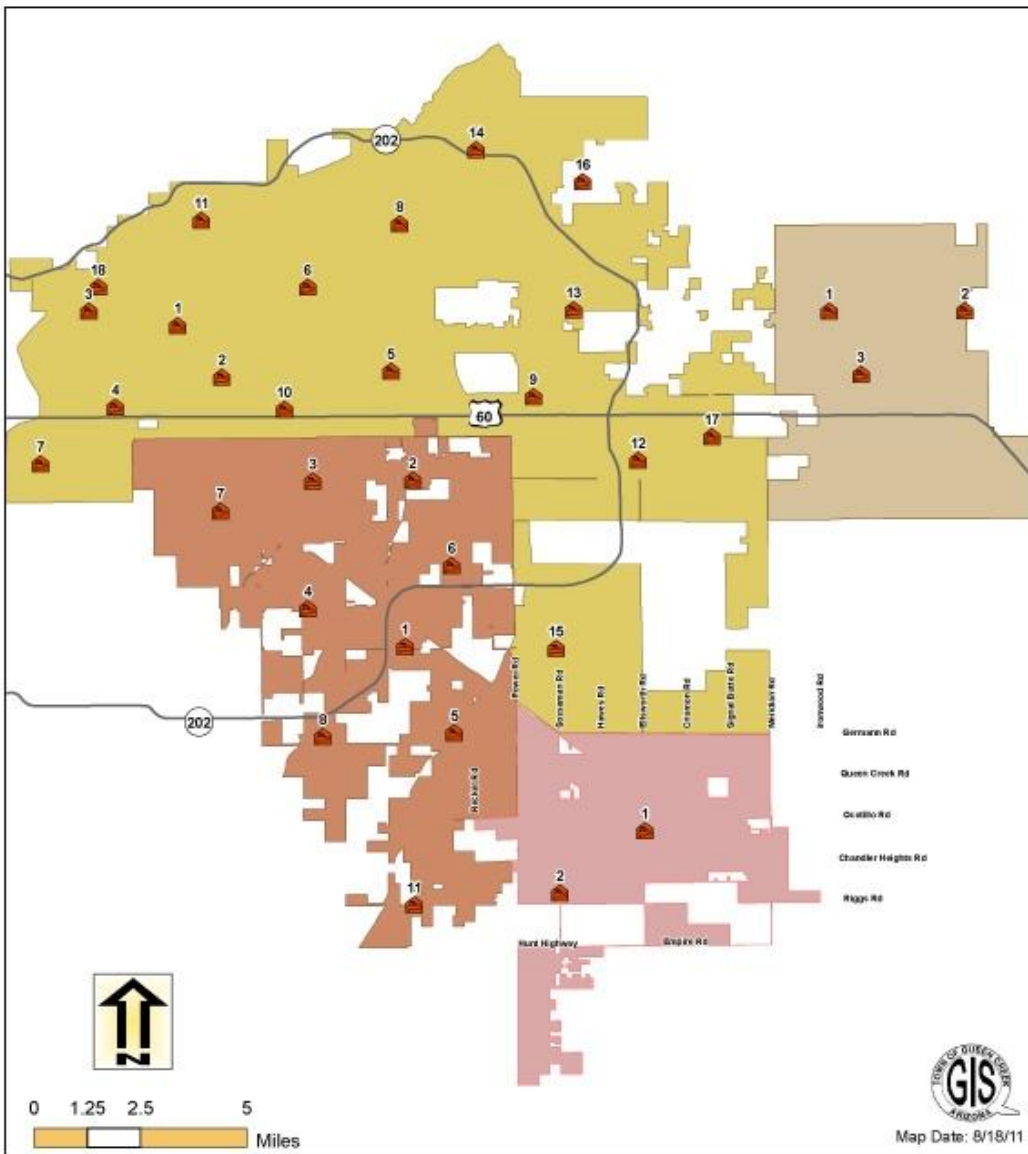

Benefits for County Island Residents

- ▣ All fire apparatus are equipped with automatic vehicular locators that allows the computer aided dispatch system (in Mesa) to know where each vehicle is located physically.
- ▣ The dispatch system always sends the closest unit(s) regardless as to who they belong to (including ambulances).
- ▣ Membership in a disaster preparation and response system that is managed by the Queen Creek Emergency Operations Center.
- ▣ Enhanced public safety education.
- ▣ Lower annual costs for services.
