Phoenix day trip **Queen Creek**

Why go now: Late fall means great hiking, U-pick farms, and more pretty horses than a Budweiser commercial. What it's known for: Mormon churches and olives-lots of olives. How to find it: From Phoenix, go southeast until you run out of freeway. Queen Creek is the wide-open swath of farmland next door to Gilbert. What you'll see: Urban cowboys with trucks, trailers, and two mares in the front yard. November temps: 70° with a strong chance of more 70°. Royal title: Queen Creek is named after a rivulet that flows more than 100 miles from the old Silver Queen Mine near Superior. Sport a Stetson: For rodeo events—like barrel racing and steer roping—at Horseshoe Park & Equestrian Centre (free; 20464 E. Riggs Rd.; 480/358-3710). Doing all right: Queen Creek's median household income of \$83,145 is roughly 50 percent higher than that of Phoenix. Classic meat market: QC boasts the Valley's best old-timey butcher in the Pork Shop (3359 E. Combs Rd.; 480/987-0101). Bring a cooler, lest your thick bacon spoil. >24

3. Eat an olive oil waffle

At Del Piero, the Tuscan-style cafe (\$) at the Queen Creek Olive Mill, you'll find killer artichoke eggs Benedict made without even a pat of butter. That's how serious the folks at Arizona's only working olive mill are about their signature ware. Stroll 3 acres of groves, take a class on olive oil (\$5), but don't leave without biting into a divine Meyer lemon cupcake. 25062 S. Meridian Rd.; 480/888-9290.



In nearby Gilbert, the tranquil Orange Blossom Hacienda is set deep within a 100-year-old citrus grove, which you'll smell as you loll by the amoebashaped pool. The only thing better than the B&B's views of the San Tan Mountains are the rich prickly pear pancakes it serves for breakfast. From \$95; orangeblossomhacienda.com



The Deli, a zero-pretense pizzaand-salad bistro, is also the best wine-sipping spot in town. Drink in the sunset, along with your '08 Primitivo, in a pleasant breezeway that doubles as the restaurant's outdoor patio. If you feel a wee peckish, order the succulent, well-seasoned carpaccio or an apple-chickensalad sandwich (left), \$\$; closed Sun; 18914 E. San Tan Blvd.; 480/279-3546.




Getting there
